## CLERGY CORNER

### Easter All Year Round

In this part of the world we might see the expression “Christmas in July” in connection with a summer sale at a local retailer on their advertising flyer or in connection with radio or television ads.

“Christmas in July” has also been associated with celebrations at summer camps and with attempts to encourage people to make early preparations for Christmas, including preparations for mission distributions overseas and for sending Christmas mail to those serving overseas at the end of World War II. Prior to that, a 1940 Hollywood movie comedy “Christmas in July” gave the expression and ideas associated with it more prominence.

But in the Christian church, it is Easter and not Christmas that is our primary festival. Each Sunday is a celebration of Easter. This practice is most striking during the season of Lent, as we count the forty days of Lent excluding the Sundays. The fact that each Sunday is a celebration of Easter raises two questions. The first would be, “What is it that makes Easter so important for us?” and the second would be “How can the celebration of Easter be kept alive, be sustained all year long?”

The celebration of Easter marks the triumph of Jesus Christ over death in his resurrection from death. In a world where we all face death inevitably, and where for many people various tragedies and losses, disappointments and brokenness in relationship have shattered their hopes, dreams, and any sense of having a normal or peaceful life, Easter is a powerful message of hope. It both is and stands for the overcoming of all that ails us, of all the destruction that sin, selfishness, and just simply what adverse circumstances have wrought. It promises life and restoration.

Keeping Easter alive all year round might involve a wide variety of practices. In this article I really only have opportunity to comment our frame of mind, a frame of mind that fosters this celebration of Easter. I might surprise us, but it really shouldn't, that is, that this begins by rightly acknowledging death and the many disappointments around us, both our own and those which we observe or hear about that others face. In addition, a realistic appraisal that perfection can not be reached in our own lives in anything we attempt or anywhere on earth empowers us to keep our sanity. But more profoundly, simply remembering that Easter is hope brought into every failure and loss, and that beyond each disappointment lies a picture of what life can be and will be in an eternity with God. An Easter hope forms or we might say catches that picture. This Easter hope is not passive, but rather finds itself inspired and empowered to live hope in the present. Because it anticipates the welcome and wholeness of the future it cannot contain itself but even strives to see the beauty of that vision lived out and practiced today.

## FROM OUR SYNOD BISHOP

The season of spring, and the season of Easter which we continue to celebrate, join together in a single theme – the hope of new birth. Grass greens, trees bud, flowers bloom, seeds sprout: a virtual panoply of new birth, new life. The green blade rises from the buried grain.

Easter tells us that Love (in the person of Jesus) is come again like wheat arising green (see *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* hymn 379). As Christians we confess that death and the grave could not hold Jesus, and we proclaim with the angels: “He has risen as he said”. Jesus is the vouchsafe and guarantee of our resurrection-hope – the first-fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

The Mayan family Easter took on new a dimension this year. A grandchild arrived during the first hour of Good Friday – a girl finely formed, pleasantly featured, dark haired with the tens (fingers and toes) and the twos (eyes and ears) all accounted for. Jordyn instantly garnered the love of her parents (and grandparents). And more than that. Holding the newborn we experienced a re-birth of hope in the Creator, the creation, life itself – and especially this one little brand-new life, precious and precarious - so needy, so vulnerable - entrusted to us. In each of your life-journeys, give thanks for all the new life – in fact, “dance to the life around you!” (see *Worship and Praise* #126).

## COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

April 16, 2009

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The focus of our meeting was to assess the financial situation of Messiah. As of March 31, 2009 we have a closing combined deficit of \$55,210. However, we want to acknowledge the many positive programs and activities that were produced during the past year. Messiah supported positive activities within the church, but also, in the community. This year we would like to keep our budget below \$465,000 and, with your help, eliminate the deficit. We give thanks for the support given by the members of Messiah so that we can support projects in our church as well as many community projects. **THANK YOU MESSIAH MEMBERS FOR YOUR SUPPORT!**

Our Treasurer, Ron Berg, prepared a financial format to guide us through the many financial discussions and decisions. The resulting information will be brought to the Financial Committee to help them prepare a budget for the coming year to present to the Council for recommendation to the Annual Meeting of Messiah. Some financial requests were reduced or deferred as items that could be considered only after the essentials are looked after.

As a result of our discussion, some areas were identified for future consideration. These will be reviewed, by the relevant committee, to assess if any changes would be advantageous. Some of these are:

- Costs of operation of the church facility.
- Photo copying and paper usage
- Check to see if we could have better banking rates
- Review of designated funds and how these funds are set up
- Review of committee budget needs
- Review of possible uses of building
- Review of costs and impact of VBS
- Review of advertising costs
- Acknowledgement of continuing repairs because of the age of our building
- If you have any more suggestions please contact the Council

We are looking forward to an exciting year with many challenges. With God as our strength and guide, we view the future with confidence and hope.

*A Faith-based discussion of Alberta's Oil Sands Development*

May 21, 7:00-9:30 pm  
The King's University College (Atrium)  
9125 - 50th Street, Edmonton

Come for an evening of reflection and faith-based discussion on the topic of Alberta oil sands development and its impact on our lives and the environment.

This event is sponsored by the KAIROS-Edmonton Committee. KAIROS: Canadian Ecumenical Justice Initiatives is a partnership of 11 churches and church-related organizations working on issues of social and ecological justice.

As part of its ongoing work on energy justice, the national KAIROS office is coordinating a delegation of Canadian church leaders, Indigenous and Southern partners to the Athabasca oil sands from May 20th to 27th.

The May 21st event is on the eve of the tour's journey north, which will also bring them into discussions with Indigenous peoples, workers, industry representatives and elected officials. The church leaders' wish for May 21st is to have meaningful conversations with people living in Edmonton and hear the concerns that are on our minds and in our hearts. All are welcome!

**STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION:****POWER SAVE OPTIONS ON COMPUTERS**

The typewriter, once a mainstay of offices and used in churches and mission organizations, is almost a thing of the past. The introduction of computers into the home and workplace is one of the big changes of the last 20 – 30 years. Computers, which bring with them many advantages, also use electricity. As we are more aware of the environment and *Stewardship of Creation*, we are also concerned about the amount of electricity these devices use.

Several weeks ago I used a Kill-A-Watt meter to determine my computer's power usage at different settings. They are as follows:

**POWER USAGE**

1. On, after booting up: 130 Watts.
2. Idle, 2 programs open: 134 Watts.
3. Screen Saver on: 160-164 Watts. 4-5 second recovery
4. After monitor turned off: 77 Watts. 5 second recovery
5. Monitor off; hard drive shuts down: 75-77 Watts.
6. After system goes to standby: 7 Watts. 8 second recovery
7. After the system hibernates: 5 Watts. 15 second recovery
8. Computer is turned off: 7 Watts
9. Power bar is turned off: 0 Watts.

One of the things that you will notice is that **my screen saver was NOT saving power. In fact, it was using more power.** Since that time I have found that some screen savers do not use as much power. However, our Staff at Messiah are encouraged to not use a screen saver, and the screen savers have been turned off (in the **Control Panel**, under **Appearances and Themes** or under **Display, Screen Savers**, set to **None**). On that same window there is a box labeled **Power ...** which is one of the places where the Power Options can be set. Using these settings is a more effective way to both save the screens and save power.

The following is the pattern I use on my computer:

<b>Setting Time</b>	<b>Reactivate</b>	<b>Recovery Time</b>
Turn off monitor:		
After 5 minutes.	Move Mouse	5 second
Turn off hard discs:		
Never.		
System standby:		
After 10 minutes.	Press enter key	8 second
System hibernates:		
2 hours	Press power switch	15 second

Most of the individual workstation will have variations of this pattern, hopefully designed to fit the working patterns of the individual (or the pattern of interruptions that come their way).

So **perhaps you are wondering what difference this might make in both Kilowatt hours and in cost.** Based on a cost per KWh of \$.14171 (using the November power bill) and assuming that I remember to turn the computer fully off when I am away for holidays, study leave, and conferences,

**I estimate power usage at 154 KWh per year for a cost of \$21.82 for the year.**

For comparison, it has become common for people to leave their computers on all the time with the screen saver set to come on when the computer is idle.

A screen saver using:

98 Watts per hour uses 905.82 KWh per year for an estimated cost of \$128.36 per year.

132 Watts per hour uses 1,157 KWh per year for an estimated cost of \$163.97 per year

162 Watts per hour uses 1,420 KWh per year for an estimated cost of \$201.23 per year

This indicates a substantial and almost ten-fold difference between what my computer is using and what it would have been using if I had been using a more energy demanding screen saver.

If you are wishing more information on how this works you can find a sheet with more detailed instructions at the information centre, or by asking at the church office. If you are experimenting with your computer at home, you may find that some computers do not comply as well with these settings. And yes, the newer computer monitors, the flat thin ones, do use less electricity.
